This newsletter article will be a little different than others that I have shared during my time as your pastor. Usually, I try to sum up a lesson, give encouragement, or provide a mini sermon in these pages. This month, however, I'm going to be a little more direct with an ask for help.

Back-to-school time in the United States can be a difficult time financially for many families. I was talking with one mother who, even with searching for sales, has spent over \$700 on clothes for her ever-growing children. Add on the number of supplies that schools require, the cost of after-school care, extracurricular activities, and other incidentals, August and September can be difficult months to budget for.

In a normal year, this is already a challenge, but this year, with political and economic changes happening in our country, there is more need than ever. The Peace Food Pantry is seeing record numbers each distribution day, and we are spending money faster than ever before. Family Promise has more people in the program than at any point since 2020, with many single parents with multiple children. The United Way is preparing to distribute backpacks to more students than last year when they took over the program from Family Service.

As a congregation, Peace has risen to the occasion of many needs over the years, and we intend to continue to support our neighbors as they encounter periods of difficulty. Your faithfulness to this congregation through financial offerings, volunteerism, and prayer make being the body of Christ to the world easy, as we share our resources.






Peace Quilters News!



Aug 2 & 3 Queen Vashti

Having the bravery and confidence to stand up to an inappropriate request from a superior is both paramount to the moral foundation of society, and extremely difficult. Queen Vashti's simple reply, "no," is feared by the male "sages who knew the laws" (Esther 1:13). They advise the king to cast Queen Vashti out and to replace her with a new queen. What prophetic stance is God calling us to take? What are we afraid to hear when our norms are being challenged? Esther 1:10-22

Shadrach, Meshach & Abednego

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego exemplified courage as they walked with the presence of God among the flames. Their trust in God overcame the human tendency to fear. "Be not afraid" is a notable refrain in the bible. It speaks to the utmost importance of courage and the weighty influence of fear on our actions.

How do we stand together in faith despite the many fearful realities of the world?

Mary Magdalene

Why are we so cynical? It is easy to understand the viewpoint of doubt. But why did she believe? She never wonders if she is dreaming. She never questions whom she saw, though everyone she tells does not believe her. Perhaps she simply knows deep down what is right. She has nothing to hide, she has confessed her sins. She can see clearly. How do we allow Jesus to burst through the things that block us from seeing the simple, complex beauty of the resurrection?

Perhaps being at the end of her life helped her to see the world with eyes sharpened for the holy. Perhaps living most of her years as a widow kept her hiding in the shadows, to keep from taking up too much space. Perhaps being a prophet made her both patient and persistent, trusting that the right moment to share her wisdom would, indeed, come.

Luke could have easily left Anna out of the story. But she leans in—from the margins, from the shadows, from the edges of the scene to approach her newborn king.

Where do we find ourselves waiting for God's promises to come true? How do we trust the promises are on their way? How do we recognize them when they arrive?

Lydia

Despite her outsider status and how women are typically portrayed in scripture, Lydia is a woman of power, influence, and dignity. Purple dye was a luxury item for the elite, so we are to assume that Lydia is an established businesswoman. Lydia's first act as a new disciple is hospitality. She welcomes the apostles into her home. Later, after Paul and Silas are released from prison, her large home becomes the meeting place for the apostles and the growing Christian community in Philippi.

As the only Philippian convert named in Acts, Lydia was quite possibly the leader and patron of the Philippian church. She used her wealth to establish the community, she risked her reputation as a businesswoman to house foreigners released from prison, she sanctified her conversion with acts of radical hospitality.

What are we willing to put up as sacrifice to service of the gospel?

- 9 Pray for local, state and national leaders, that they will respect and respond to our neighbors on the fringes of society, including people who suffer poverty and hunger, who need shelter, who live with illnesses and conditions requiring constant care, and whose rights and protections have diminished. Pray for compassion, strength and persistent courage to advocate and care for our neighbors in need.
- 10 Pray for the Spirit's guidance and wisdom in understanding the parables Jesus shared over two thousand years ago, and for insight into the admonitions and wisdom they offer us today.
- 11 Pray for our missionaries and Young Adults in Global Mission who accompany global partners in 10 European countries, serving in ministries that provide education, pastoral leadership, social services and care for vulnerable populations.
- 12 International Youth Day Half the people on our planet are age 30 or younger. Pray for every nation to honor the gifts of young people, address the challenges they face and provide easy access to resources that contribute to their physical, spiritual, emotional, intellectual and economic well-being.
- 13 Ask God to bless those who have chosen to use their gifts, faith and time in long-term volunteer service with Lutheran Volunteer Corps, Urban Servant Corps, Holden Village or other domestic ministries.
- 14 Open our hearts and minds to see problems in the world as opportunities to encourage and care for one another, to seek new paths toward justice and peace, and to share the good news of God's mercy and love for humanity.
- 15 "Go my children, with my blessing, never alone. Waking, sleeping, I am with you, you are my own. In my love's baptismal river I have made you mine forever" (WOV 721). Praise God for being ever present in our lives and the world in times of turmoil, peace, fear, joy, failure and achievement.
- 16 Pray for students attending ELCA colleges, universities and seminaries, and other institutions of higher education, that they will grow in faith, knowledge, wisdom and commitment to serve others.

PRAYER VENTURES

August

- 17 Ask the Spirit how we might align ourselves with the commandments, desires and priorities of God, the very things Jesus made clear to us through his life, suffering, death and resurrection.
- 18 Pray for the church leaders gathering for the Ecumenical School on Governance, Economics, and Management for an Economy of Life in Seoul, South Korea. Organized by the World Council of Churches, the Lutheran World Federation and other ecumenical organizations, the school helps leaders to bridge theology and economics and to advocate for a global economic system that meets the needs of humanity and responds to the crises we face today.
- 19 Give thanks to God that, through our collective generosity, our church provides grants and scholarships to support the ministries of individuals, communities, congregations, synods, and ELCA partners and companion churches.
- 20 "Am I a God near by, says the Lord, and not a God far off? Who can hide in secret places so that I cannot see them? says the Lord. Do I not fill heaven and earth? says the Lord" (Jeremiah 23:23-24). Give thanks that God sees all evil and deception in the world, and promise to be vigilant and discerning so that we might uplift our neighbors and please God.
- 21 Pray for the work of Sumud, an initiative of our church that works for justice in Palestine and Israel, proclaiming that all humans are beloved children of God who deserve safety, security and dignity.
- 22 Give thanks for the ELCA New Congregations ministry and for the 340 new-start congregations and ministries under development in the United States and the Caribbean, supported by local leaders and their synods' bishops and directors for evangelical mission.
- 23 Pray for congregational leaders and volunteers who are preparing fall programs and community ministries to share the gospel, nurture faith, serve neighbors in need and equip people of all ages and abilities to do God's work in the world.
- 24 There is no convenient or more suitable time to respond to the suffering of our neighbors. Pray that we will be mindful of those around us near and far and promptly respond with respect, kindness, generosity, sustainable solutions and concern for their short- and long-term needs.

- 25 Pray for teachers, student teachers, administrators and other school staff, that their strength, knowledge, creativity and commitment to students will be nourished throughout the school year. Ask the Spirit to help us express our thanks and support them in tangible ways.
- 26 "Glory to God, whose goodness shines on me, and to the Son, whose grace has pardoned me, and to the Spirit, whose love has set me free" (ACS 1087). Lift up praise and thanks to God!
- 27 Give thanks for people who play a significant role in your life, including those who inspire your faith, teach you life skills, influence your values, treat you with love and respect, and show up when you need someone to lean on.
- 28 Remember in prayer children, youth and adults whose lives have been touched and inspired by outdoor ministry experiences this summer. Pray that they will bring back to their home congregations their rekindled faith, enthusiasm, confidence and commitment to love their neighbors.
- 29 Rejoice in the daily care, support and sustenance we receive from God and our siblings in Christ. Pray that we, in turn, will freely share the same with our neighbors.
- 30 Each of us has a unique faith story to tell. Ask the Spirit to help us find our own way of describing our faith journey how God works through us and how Jesus Christ defines our lives.
- 31 Ask the Spirit for the faith needed to be both confident and humble. Promise to focus on neighbors in need and to resist personal desires for reward, status or advantage.
